I am going color blind. It started happening early in my life. Until recently, I had no idea that this term is considered racist. I don't use it as a way of saying we should look past a person's skin tone and deny the race they are, and any associated struggles. Indeed, all are children of God and due the dignity and solidarity any of us could show toward one another. But this is my story...

My school bus picked up a black child living in a tenant house. No one sat with him, maybe because he smelled a bit weird, but I did. He was a pretty nice kid.

A very pretty girl with a Hispanic last name was also on my bus route. She, her brother and sister were the product of a bi-racial marriage. Their maternal grandparents owned a big cash crop farm. The house could have easily allowed all of them to live there, but instead lived in a run down trailer park.

Eventually, another black family moved into that trailer park. The parents enrolled all of the children in our Catholic school! One of the daughters was in my class. I said I would be her buddy for a science experiment, which was to be done at home. So, I invited her over to work on it. It was going well until Dad got home. He drove her home right quick.

West Side Story aired on TV when I was entering puberty. It brought me to tears. Dad couldn't understand why. I said something like, I would marry a Hispanic, if we loved each other. My Dad replied, "Oh no, you won't."

Sadly, individuals, families and society have not embraced the words of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. about judging people on the quality of their character, rather than the color of their skin. Shame on us.

On this Sunday we celebrate the Body and Blood, Soul & Divinity of Jesus Christ, the Institution of the Eucharist. Jesus did this because He wanted to leave us, of all skin colors and races, with His presence.

At Mass He is present in the assembly, in Scripture, in our songs and prayers, in the priest and in the bread and wine that has been transformed into His body and blood. When we receive, we give thanks and praise for all that we have been given, and for Jesus and The Holy Spirit alive in us! We are strengthened and renewed by remembering Jesus' sacrifice, our new Passover into eternity. By partaking we make amends for the sins of the living and the dead.

So, will you join me in accepting people of all races and skin tones as brothers and sisters in Christ? The Body of Christ is a multicolored, multiracial family.

So many changes have been forced upon us this year. One major change is the usage of the **Parish computers**. We have been holding Zoom meetings, streaming daily Mass, Fr. Leo has begun a "Launch & Leo" program that is the pandemic equivalent of "Lunch & Leo". Staying in touch via computer is becoming the new "normal" and many parishioners have shared that they are pleased to be able to stream daily Mass and the Rosary during this time. This connection has allowed us to stay in touch with many parishioners and also has reached some parishioners, that in the past, had been unable to attend in person, due to various reasons. There are also many concerned about when the church does resume public Mass, will it be safe? While we are still in the planning stages for safely resuming public participation and group gatherings, we do want to assure parishioners that we would like to continue to offer this online presence, and perhaps even expand on this ability. While technology has allowed us to stay in touch, it has also made very clear that the computers we have are being stretched to their limits. It becomes very frustrating trying to answer a simple emailed question, help someone figure out online donations, or get connected to the live stream and your computer decides to freeze. Unfortunately this need for updated computers was not foreseen and we do not have the money budgeted at this time to rectify this. We have looked at several options, and have arrived at the conclusion that we are in need of 4 computers at an estimated cost of \$3000. **We are asking for help** in continuing this connection to you. If you have benefitted from our online presence and would like it to continue, we are asking that you consider a small donation to help us update our computers so that we can continue. Hello St. Michael Families,

I wanted to reach out to families as we are now facing new challenges in conjunction with handling the Covid-19 virus. I want to let you know that as a Catholic institution, we in no way condone any form of discrimination or violence. Our teachers and staff take our responsibilities to listen and learn from the experience of those who continue to suffer oppression and discrimination. We must confront this in our classrooms, communities, homes, and our own hearts. We will continue to build a community that strives for justice and peace. This is especially important for Catholic schools and educators, given our charge to teach as Jesus did and to form students who will use their gifts to serve others and work toward a more just society.

The Most Reverend Salvatore R. Matano, Bishop of Rochester in his released June 5, 2020 stated, "I unite with my brother Bishops throughout our country, with other faith communities and with all people of good will in praying for healing, the restoration of peace and an end to violence and racism which scar the dignity of every person...we continue to work for that day when, regardless of our differences, we conduct our lives with civility, charity, honesty, and mutual respect."
