we go forth in faith to love and serve one another.

I think we are going to be talking about and acting on examining ourselves on the issue of Racism for a long time.

Our US Bishops and Pope Francis have stated, "Racism is a sin." It's not explicitly mentioned in the 10 Commandments, but the 7<sup>th</sup> could be used to validate it: "You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor." People who practice racism generally hold beliefs that see others as less. Our beliefs can be contributing to racism.

When Jesus told the Apostles that all the commandments could be summed into two: Love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, mind, soul and strength and your neighbor as yourself, that gets much closer to knowing that practicing racism is a sin.

In a recent edition of the Wall Street Journal appeared the article, "The Disparate Racial Impact of Requiring a College Degree." The authors called on corporate America to do more than practice charity. Specifically, they called for a change in hiring and management practices that focused on having the right skills and work experience to perform the desired work. (People of color attain fewer advanced educational degrees than their white counterparts. Yet, through work experience and acquisition of skills through alternative routes, many people can be a better fit for some positions currently posted as needing a bachelor's degree or higher.)

The skills of the present & future? Critical thinking. Problem solving. Creativity. Leadership. Team player. Literate. Accepting of diversity. Self-disciplined and self-aware (emotional intelligence). Attention to service. Ability to make sound decisions and negotiate. Flexible.

If corporate America wants its workforce to have advanced degrees, then hiring those with the right work experiences and skill set should mean investing in those workers to achieve the desired degree while keeping them in the workforce, the authors posited.

Culture also has much to do with racism. If we are unaware of how cultures differ, yet hold them to the viewer's standard, then we have not loved our neighbor as ourselves.

Recently, Cardinal Timothy Dolan, Archbishop of New York, praised Pres. Trump's anti-abortion stance. Pro-lifers pointed out that tearing apart immigrant families is anything but pro-life. Can we be good stewards, good Christians, if we deny climate change exists, support of economic policies that hurt the poor and the existence of racial division? Dolan, responding in the WSJ, reminded readers that in order to move forward we need to recognize our past and want to change.

Bottom line? "What would Jesus do?" Let this guide our thoughts, speech and actions. Read this month's Justice, Peace & Life newsletter (linked to our website), to learn what some in the U.S. Catholic Church are saying on racial justice.

**Gospel: Matthew 10:37-42**

The Lord be with you.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

**Glory to you, O Lord.**

On that day, Jesus went out of the house and sat down by the sea. Such large crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat down, and the whole crowd stood along the shore. And he spoke to them at length in parables, saying: "A sower went out to sow. And as he sowed, some seed fell on the path, and birds came and ate it up. Some fell on rocky ground, where it had little soil. It sprang up at once because the soil was not deep, and when the sun rose it was scorched, and it withered for lack of roots. Some seed fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked it. But some seed fell on rich soil, and produced fruit, a hundred or sixty or thirtyfold. Whoever has ears ought to hear."

The disciples approached him and said, "Why do you speak to them in parables?" He said to them in reply, "Because knowledge of the mysteries of the kingdom of heaven has been granted to you, but to them it has not been granted. To anyone who has, more will be given and he will grow rich; from anyone who has not, even what he has will be taken away. This is why I speak to them in parables, because they look but do not see and hear but do not listen or understand. Isaiah's prophecy is fulfilled to them, which says:

You shall indeed hear but not understand, you shall indeed look but never see.

Gross is the heart of this people, they will hardly hear with their ears, they have closed their eyes, lest they see with their eyes and hear with their ears and understand with their hearts and be converted, and I heal them.

"But blessed are your eyes, because they see, and your ears, because they hear. Amen, I say to you, many prophets and righteous people longed to see what you see but did not see it, and to hear what you hear but did not hear it.

"Hear then the parable of the sower. The seed sown on the path is the one who hears the word of the kingdom without understanding it, and the evil one comes and steals away what was sown in his heart. The seed sown on rocky ground is the one who hears the word and receives it at once with joy. But he has no root and lasts only for a time. When some tribulation or persecution comes because of the word, he immediately falls away. The seed sown among thorns is the one who hears the word, but then worldly anxiety and the lure of riches choke the word and it bears no fruit. But the seed sown on rich soil is the one who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and yields a hundred or sixty or thirtyfold."

**Hello St. Michael Families,**

I am reaching out with a quick update for families. We are continuing to focus on reopening procedures for this fall. All preliminary plans are to be submitted to the Department of Education before next Monday (although there has been no guidance from New York State leaders as of this date). The Diocese has been working diligently on plans for the last several weeks and we are nearly ready to submit our individual and district level school plans. As soon as we have approval for these plans, I will share that information with you. I know these are uncertain times, but we are making plans to provide a safe 5 day per week program.



In addition, we are aware of the rising financial concerns for families and are making every effort to address these as they arise. In addition, the lack of spring fundraising and annual appeal have left us with depleted funds that we are working to alleviate so that we can support more families. This has made some delays in applying financial aid to accounts. We are currently looking to raise additional tuition assistance funds to support more families. If anyone is able to help support other St. Michael families they are encouraged to make contributions to the "Adopt a Student Fund". As soon as we are able to gather all the information for families through FACTS, the funds will be applied to the accounts. I thank you for your patience as we try to support as many families as we can at this time.

As we prepare for the new school year, please remember that you are all in our daily prayers. We hope that you are safe, healthy, and in good spirits.
