How did St. Paul view the Eucharist?

It is no accident that when we think of Christ's real presence in the Eucharist, our minds go immediately to the 6th chapter of the Gospel of John. However, John 6 is not the only scripture passage that deals with Christ's real presence in the Eucharist. Consider St. Paul's letter to the Corinthian church. In 1 Cor. 11, St. Paul tells the Corinthians that,

23 For I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, 24 and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." 25 In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." 26 For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes. - NRSV

Before we read any further, it is important to note that St. Paul wrote BEFORE any of the Gospels were written. This most likely means that these words to the Corinthians reflect what St. Paul had been taught by Jesus' disciples, since there was no other source for Paul to learn the faith. Now, someone might say, "So what if these words came from Jesus or Jesus' disciples? Jesus was simply speaking figuratively." But, this line of argument fails quite badly as St. Paul goes on to tell the Corinthians that,

27 Whoever, therefore, eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord in an unworthy manner will be answerable for the body and blood of the Lord. 28 Examine yourselves, and only then eat of the bread and drink of the cup. 29 For all who eat and drink without discerning the body, eat and drink judgment against themselves. 30 For this reason many of you are weak and ill, and some have died. - NRSV

If St. Paul had viewed the bread and the wine simply as some form of figurative language, he would not have told the Corinthians that they were becoming ill and possibly even dying because they had taken the bread and the wine in an unworthy manner. Clearly, no one would become ill or die if Jesus' words were simply figurative.
